



CUP-TIE CLUB RECORDS



In 1888-89, PRESTON won the League championship without losing a match, and in the same season won the F.A. Cup without having a goal scored against them during the competition.

ASTON VILLA are the only other club who have won the League and the Cup in the same season. They did so in 1896-97.

BURY'S score of 6-0 against Derby County in 1903 is a record for Cup Finals.

In 1929-30, GLASGOW RANGERS won the Scottish Cup, the Scottish League championship, the Glasgow Cup, the Glasgow Charity Cup and the Scottish Second Eleven Cup. The Charity Cup was won by the toss of a coin, after two hours' battling with Celtic in the final. They followed this by again winning everything played for in 1933-34. CELTIC performed that feat once—in 1908.

In 1937-38, a Scottish Second Division club, EAST FIFE, won the Scottish Cup for the first time.

ASTON VILLA and BLACKBURN ROVERS are England's joint record cup-holders. Each club has won the trophy six times.

In 1934-35, BISHOP AUCKLAND created a new record by winning the F.A. Amateur Cup for the sixth time. CLAPTON have had five successes.

CARDIFF CITY are the only club to take the F.A. Cup out of England. They beat Arsenal 1-0 in the 1927 final.

The first club to win the F.A. Cup with an all-English eleven was WEST BROMWICH ALBION, in 1887-88.


At the first F.A. Cup final played at Wembley in 1923 between BOLTON W. and WEST HAM UTD., the crowd broke in. The official attendance was 126,047, but there were probably over 150,000 present. The gross gate was £27,776.

Record Scottish Cup final figures were put up in 1937—attendance, 146,433; receipts, £12,248

The record crowd at an Amateur Cup final was at the ILFORD-LEYTON game in 1929. There were 35,034 spectators.

LINFIELD, the Irish League club, wan seven trophies in season 1921-22—the Irish Cup. Irish League Cup, Belfast City Cup. Albandias (Irish League) Cup, Irish Gold Cup. Itelfast Charity Cup and County Antein Shield.

The Scottish Cup was withheld in 1908 on and the Irish Cup in 1919 20, after richard scenes.

FAMOUS CUP-TIE PERSONALITIES



Alan Morton, Scottish international outsideleft, secured 38 medals before the close of his playing career in 1932-33. Among these were included Scottish Cup (3), Glasgow Cup (7), tlasgow Charity Cup (8), Scottish League thamptonship (9).

G. Petrie's 13 goals from outside-right for Arbroath against Bon Accord in a Scottish Cup the on September 5, 1885, constitute a world's superior record.

Hilly Meredith, who played in 51 international matches for Wales, appeared in the F.A. Cup competition for Manchester City in 1921-24, when in his 50th year. He retired the following season.

The biggest fine ever imposed by the Pautball League was that of £750 on Newcastle United (Cup-winners) for playing weak teams in seven League matches.

The fifteen clubs which entered for the first P.A. Cup competition in 1871-72 were:—
Harnes, Civil Service, Crystal Palace, Clapham Hovers, Donnington School (Spalding), Hampman Heathens, Harrow Chequers, Hitchin, Maddenhead, Marlow, Queen's Park (Glasgow), Reigate Priory, Royal Engineers, Upton Park and Wanderers. Three scratched.

Individual goal-scoring record in F.A. Cup finals is held jointly by Wm. Townley (Black-

burn R.), v. Sheffield Wednesday in 1890, and J. Logan, for Notts County, v. Bolton W., in 1894. Each scored three goals.

Ballymena created a record in 1928-29 by winning the Irish Cup in their first year as a senior club, and their first year in the competition.

The Corinthians competed for the F.A. Cup for the first time in 1922-23.

In 1930-31, F. Roberts, Glentoran and Irish international centre-forward, scored 96 goals, including the following:—Irish League 55, Belfast City Cup 27, Irish Cup 4.

Lancashire carried off the three principal honours in 1927-28, namely—the F.A. Cup (Blackburn R.), and the championships of the First Division (Everton) and Second Division (Manchester City).

The first Cup final attended by a reigning monarch was the tie between Burnley and Liverpool on April 25, 1914, when King George V. was present.

When Alec Jackson, famous Scots international outside-right, scored for Huddersfield in the 1927-28 F.A. Cup final it was the first time for 13 years both sides had scored in a final tie. Since then it has happened five times.

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
